David Johnson is the author of *The Handbook of Alabama's Prehistoric Indians and Artifacts*. In November of 2009, he found a prehistoric site on his property. In attempting to learn more about the artifacts he was finding, he discovered that the only information readily available to the public was in the form of placing a monetary value on the items as opposed to a historic value. Working with members of the Alabama Archaeological Society (a group of professional archaeologists, avocationals, and collectors), the Handbook was developed to provide information regarding prehistoric Indian artifacts to the public in such a manner as to educate the public not only about the artifacts but the artifacts importance in filling in the pieces of the puzzle that makeup Alabama's prehistory. David and his wife April are now retired and spend most of their time working on archaeological projects around the state, along wit sponsoring field trips for school age children, and encouraging the public to learn more about the benefits of preserving our past.



Can you tell which of the following statements are Factual and which of them are Fictional?

1. ARCHAEOLOGISTS ONLY WORK IN OTHER PLACES, | SUCH AS EGYPT, ROME, OR MEXICO CITY.

FICTION! Archaeologists work all over the world including here on the Gulf Coast! Evidence of human activity in this area dates to 14,000 years ago. Archaeologists study everything from the oldest sites to those that are as recent as 50 years old.

2. ARCHAEOLOGISTS ARE ONLY INTERESTED IN | ARTIFACTS THAT ARE VALUABLE.

FICTION!

Archaeologists rarely recover gold or precious gems from archaeological excavations. In fact, archaeologists are really interested in what people leave behind, most often their trash and not their treasures. These artifacts help us better understand the daily lives of people who lived in the past.

3. ARCHAEOLOGISTS CONSULT WITH AND ASK DESCENDANT COMMUNITIES TO COLLABORATE WITH THEM BEFORE EXCAVATING AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE.

FACT! Unlike Indiana Jones, archaeologists consult with descendant communities to preserve and protect their cultural materials, resources, and heritage.
